11:00 am Classroom 538	Alexander Technique, Mindfulness, and Your Flute, with Abbé Krieger and Aldo Ruis-Alonso from The Buddhist Flutist® & Balance Arts Center. Flute in hand, you are invited to come to connect with yourself, others, and your instrument using the Alexander Technique principles of awareness and space. We will explore some of the untapped places inside and outside your body, your instrument, and the room so that you get to have more tools to use to show up more wholly to play, practice, rehearse, teach, audition, and perform.
11:00 am Music Classroom 104	Echoes of Piazzolla: The Flute's Improvisational Journey through Bandoneon Styles, with flutist Sarah Rulli and guitarist Isabella Abbonizio. In this introduction to Astor Piazzolla's <i>Libertango</i> , they will discuss improvisational techniques, highlighting specific ornaments used by Piazzolla and how these can be adapted for the flute. They will also illustrate how the improvisational style of the bandoneon translates to the flute, emphasizing articulation and phrasing that capture the essence of tango. The audience will participate in an improvisation challenge, forming small groups to experiment with and share their interpretations of <i>Libertango</i> .

From Renaissance to romantic, from wooden flutes to electronics, flute maker Boaz Berney and friends present celebration of historical flutes. Nuria Canales Rubio, Evan Fraser, and Melanie Williams, students of Sandra Miller in the Juilliard historical performance program, will perform works of W. F. Bach, Hotteterre, and Telemann. Robbie Lee will demonstrate and improvise on baroque flutes and electronics.

12:00 noon Classroom 522	Effortless Sound: The Power of Breath Coordination in Flute Playing with Vanessa Mulvey. Breath coordination is fundamental to playing ease, performing confidence, and playfulness in expression. This workshop will focus on the key components of breath coordination and management, then experience the principles in sound production. Participants will see and experience how to optimize the relationship of the rib cage with the pelvis for efficient breath management and will gain tools to cultivate coordinated breathing in playing and teaching. The session will draw on concepts from Body Mapping.

2:00 pm Classroom 538	Shakuhachi Workshop with James Nyoraku Schlefer. The penetrating and haunting sound of the shakuhachi has a long and rich history associated with Buddhist meditation. More recently shakuhachi can be heard in many contemporary genres, including classical music, jazz, anime soundtracks, and game music. Grand Master James Nyoraku Schlefer's presentation will give a brief demonstration of both traditional and contemporary shakuhachi music followed by a hands-on workshop for participants to learn shakuhachi notation and begin to make a sound on beginner instruments, which will be provided.		
2:00 pm Classroom 522	Alexander Technique for Comfort, Coordination, and Confidence, with Fanny Wyrick-Flax. This interactive presentation will provide strategies to help flutists address and prevent injury, practice more effectively, and manage themselves for career longevity. Participants will be able to identify unhelpful habits, make conscious choices in thought and movement, and apply principles of the Alexander Technique to their daily music practice. No previous experience in Alexander Technique is required.		
2:00 pm Performing Arts Space	Emotion and Fantasy: A DCFlutes Journey, directed by Aaron Goldman and Sandra Ragusa. The official flute ensemble of the Flute Society of Washington plays works of Ravel, Rozman, Semini, and Nielsen.

ABOUT THE GUEST ARTIST



Gary Schocker, flutist, pianist, harpist, prolific composer, and teacher was born into a musical family in Easton, Pennsylvania, and began to play the piano before he was three years old. His father, Paul Schocker, was a multitalented instrumentalist and composer as well and music was a part of his life from the very start. The flute came into his

life at age 10, and by the time he was 15, he had performed as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra and the New York Philharmonic, the latter in a nationally televised Young People's Concert. He attended the Juilliard School and subsequently won several competitions. The most important of these was the Young Concert Artists International Auditions in 1985, which offered professional management, leading to his debut recital in NY. Mr. Schocker has since performed and taught around the world.

As a composer, Gary Schocker has won many awards and has received commissions from instrumental societies, performing groups, and individuals. To date he has written more than 1,800 works, more than 300 of them currently in print. His musicals, *Far From The Madding Crowd* and *The Awakening*, can be heard on original cast recordings featuring several Tony-award winning performers. Both shows were winners of the Global Search for New Musicals in the UK.

Decades of study of the Alexander Technique and Feldenkreis Methods have helped him develop his own teaching style. In addition to teaching a monthly virtual masterclass. which includes players from all around the globe, Mr. Schocker teaches at his home in New York City and, since 2003, at his summer master classes. garyschocker.com



Isabella Abbonizio is an Italian guitarist and musicologist based in NYC. A member of the Royal Conservatory College of Examiners, she holds a PhD in musicology (University of Rome), MA with honors in musicology (University of Bologna), and guitar diploma (Conservatory of Bologna). She was a visiting scholar at NYU from 2012 to 2019 and has presented her works at international cultural and academic institutions. Ms. Abbonizio performs internationally as a soloist and in chamber ensembles and has more than ten years of experience teaching in public and private schools. She is co-founder and co-artistic director of the Lanciano International Guitar Seminar and co-founder and CEO of DalMaestro, a piano and guitar school.

Gary Adler has been a New York-based theatre musician for over 30 years. He attended the University of Michigan, where he studied accompanying with Martin Katz and composition with William Bolcom. On Broadway, he conducted *Urinetown, Kinky Boots*, and the entire run of *Avenue Q*. Mr. Adler has composed music and arrangements for the Radio City Christmas Spectacular and wrote both music and lyrics for the long-running Off-Broadway hit *Altar Boyz*.

Carla Auld is a soloist and chamber musician who is committed to the performance and recording of new classical and cross-over music. She performs regularly as a soloist with the West Side Oratorio Orchestra. She is a founding member of the ensemble UpTown Flutes, a winner of the Artist International Chamber Music Award. She has released three CDs: A Flute Renaissance, An UpTown Christmas, and 21st Century Gems. Her solo CD, Beauty in America, features the works of contemporary living American composers written primarily for flute and orchestra. Carla Auld has also been recognized for her work as a founder and artistic director of organizations related to music and arts administration.

Janet Axelrod enjoys a multifaceted career as soloist, collaborative artist, and educator. *Act One* is the debut album of works she commissioned. She held the solo flute/piccolo position at Radio City Music Hall for more than 20 years. Her Broadway credits include *The Lion King* and *Wicked*. Janet Axelrod tours with artists from Brian Wilson to Deep Purple to Andrea Bocelli. She records for film, video games, and TV (including *Sesame Street* and the Super Bowl.) Axelrod is a world flute artist and performs on native flutes from cultures across every continent.

Fabian Bachelis has been playing flute for exactly two years at Special Music School. He also enjoys singing and is very creative.

Boaz Berney studied traverso at the Royal Conservatory, The Hague, with Wilbert Hazelzet. He began making flutes in 1994, after an apprenticeship with Peter van der Poel. From 1995 to 1998 he worked at the Gemeente Museum in The Hague, where he compiled a catalogue of the Baroque flutes in the collection and undertook conservation work on various woodwinds. The first copies he made were of flutes in this collection. In addition to making flutes he plays traverso professionally as a member of the Modena Consort and several other ensembles, performing music from the 16th to the 19th centuries on period instruments. Mr. Berney has been based in Montréal, Québec since 2009. Berneyflutes.com

In 2023, he took a position with the West Point Academy band.

Mary-Mitchell Campbell is a Grammy-winning music director, pianist, conductor, arranger, and composer. She has worked on many Broadway shows, symphony concerts, celebrity-filled benefits, and TV/film projects. She is passionate about making arts education accessible for everyone, and she founded Arts Ignite in 2005 to bring the arts to young people in communities often overlooked. She is also passionate in pursuit of leveling the music industry field for female, nonbinary, and musicians of color.

Chloe Carrano, age 14, is a ninth grader at Newton (MA) South High School. She has been a student of Barbara Nakazawa for five years. Chloe is a member of New England Conservatory's Massachusetts Youth Wind Ensemble and placed principal chair in MMEA district festivals. An active chamber player, she has attended Greenwood Music Camp, participates in NEC's chamber music program, and is in her school's honors wind ensemble. Chloe enjoys expressing herself through music as well as through creative writing. This year, she received Scholastic Art and Writing Regional Gold Awards for both memoir and short story works.

David Chase is musically peripatetic, with one foot firmly planted on Broadway (40+ productions as arranger and/or music director), another foot in television and film (*Schmigadoon, The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel, Crazy Ex-Girlfriend, Sound of Music Live!, Joker 2);* hands in the choral world (many works for Judith Clurman's Essential Voices); hands in many other places including the Boston Pops, Lyric Opera of Chicago, Kennedy Center Honors, and Radio City Music Hall; and tongue firmly planted in cheek. 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
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
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
