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1993 NYFC Competition Winners To Play On September 26, 6:30PM

NYFC will showcase the winners of the 1993 competition on September 26, 1993 at 6:30PM in CAMI Hall. The winners are Christina Jennings (1st prize), Sungyoon Kim (2nd prize), and Elizabeth Anne Ostling (3rd prize). Congratulations to all!

Our first place winner, Christina
Jennings, is an undergraduate, at the Juilliard
School where she studies with Jeanne
Baxtesser. Ms. Jennings began flute lessons at
the age of 7. At 14, she soloed with the
Vermont Philharmonic and recently she soloed
with the Windham Orchestra in VT, the Suburban Symphony (Cleveland), the Cleveland
Philharmonic and the Canton Symphony (OH).
Ms. Jennings' won the Kent State Young Artist
Competition, the ARTS Competition and the
Central Ohio Flute Competition and was a
finalist in the William C. Byrd Competition in
Flint, MI.

During the summer of 1992, Ms.
Jennings attended the Sarasota Music Festival
(FL) and also served as a member of the faculty at the Greenwood Music School in
Cummington, MA.

Ms. Jennings' principal teachers have been Leone Buyse, Martha Aarons and Carol Wincenc.

Korean born Sungyoon Kim came to New York in 1988. At 14, she entered the Pre-College Division of the Juilliard School and studied with Bradley Garner. In 1989, she was one of the six finalists in the Japan Flutists Association International Competition. In 1990, at the age of 16, she entered the college division of the Juilliard School. Also in 1990, she performed with the Korean Symphony and participated in a joint recital with Mr. Garner at the Seoul Art Center Recital Hall. She is a student of Julius Baker at the Juilliard School.

Elizabeth Anne Ostling, student of Julius Baker and Jeffrey Khaner at the Curtis Institute of Music, has won many awards. While at Curtis, she won the first prize in the Quadrennial Koussevitzky Competition for Woodwinds and was a finalist in the 1993 Philadelphia Orchestra's Greenfield Concerto Competition. She has soloed with the NJ Symphony Orchestra, the Juilliard Pre-college Orchestra and the Eastern Music Festival Orchestra of Greensboro, NC.

With great sorrow we report the death on July 1 of Lewis J. Deveau, president of the Wm. S. Haynes Co. Lew was a longtime supporter of flute clubs nationwide. We will miss him greatly.

Sherlock Holmes Meets Georges Barrère

The plot thickens as we prepare to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the death of Georges Barrère, our founder, next year. So far, I've located 53 living flute students, 30 ensembles students, 9 members of his Little Symphony, and many other colleagues. I've managed to interview quite a few of these people.

The Barrère family has been located and they are backing the project enthusiastically. Paul Barrère, one of Georges's grandsons, is a rock guitarist (with a band called Little Feat that has many gold records to its credit). He looks just like his grandfather, and he can also play the flute (a little).

Many former students and colleagues have generously donated programs, photos, letters, and other memorabilia, and of course there's lots more in libraries and archives. Barrère had a varied career as flutist and conductor, and was involved with many of the composers of his time—Griffes, Riegger, and many, many more. The exhibit we'll sponsor at the New York Public Library (opening November 1994) will have many interesting surprises.

If you know of anyone who studied or played with Barrère and haven't already told me, I'd appreciate any tips!

Katherine Hoover's composition Canyon Echos, for flute and guitar, was chosen as a winner in the National Flute Association's 1993 Newly Published Music Competition. The 18-minute work, loosely based on an Apache tale of flutes and lovers, was commissioned and performed by Duologue (Susan Morris De Jong, flute and Jeffrey Van, guitar). Ms. Hoover won the competition with Medieval Suite for flute and piano in 1987 and Kokopeli for solo flute in 1991.

The Tribute to Samuel Baron was coordinated and hosted by Sue Ann Kahn. NYFC members who performed were Daniel Waitzman, Paul Gray, Patricia Harper, Mary Posses, Karl Kraber, Tara O'Connor and Barli Nugent.
