Georges Barrère and the Flute in America

Mark your calendars for the Barrère weekend, Saturday and Sunday, November 12 and 13. On Saturday, the program begins at 4:30 pm at the Bruno Walter Auditorium, New York Public Library at Lincoln Center, 111 Amsterdam Avenue, New York City. The program will be followed by a reception and opening of the exhibit Georges Barrère and the Flute in America from 6:30 to 8:30 pm in the Music Division on the third floor. The program begins with Gerardo Levy conducting flute club members in Tom Kennedy's arrangement (dedicated to the New York Flute Club) of The Marseillaise. This will be followed directly by Georges Barrère and the Flute in America, an illustrated lecture by exhibit curator Nancy Toff. After a brief intermission, Frances Blaisdell will speak in a short prelude to the concert to follow. The concert begins with the first movement of the Grand Quartet in E Minor, Op. 103 by Friedrich Kuhlau played by Eleanor Lawrence, Sue Ann Kahn, Lisa Lorraine Johnson and Rie Schmidt. Samuel Baron will perform Density 21.5 by Edgard Varèse - a work written for and dedicated to Barrère. The program includes three works by Barrère: Noctume played by Bernard Goldberg; Chanson d'automne sung by Christine Schadeberg, mezzo-soprano; and In the Vegetable Garden, a trio for 9 (maybe 10) instruments performed by Samuel Baron, flutes, Ronald Roseman, oboes and English horn, and Billy Kerr, clarinets and saxophone.

In May 1905, when Barrère left Paris, he was serenaded with The Marseillaise played by twelve of his flutist colleagues. At the first gathering of what would become the New York Flute Club, on December 5, 1920, sixteen flutists gathered at Barrère's home of to play the Kuhlau's Grand Quartet in E Minor. It became a tradition for this work to be played at club concerts. The Noctume is Barrère's only known original work for solo flute. Published by G. Schirmer in 1913, it is dedicated "A la mémoire de mon cher Maitre P. Taffanel." Chanson d'automne, with words by Paul Verlaine, is Barrere's only published song.

It was published by G. Schirmer in 1915 and is dedicated to the French tenor Edmond Clément. In the Vegetable Garden is described by Barrère as a Trio for Nine Instruments (perhaps ten). The undated manuscript score was given to the Library of Congress by Walter Damrosch, to whom it is dedicated. The full attribution on this score, in Barrère's hand, is "by Georges Barrère in collaboration with Mendelssohn, St Saëns, Massenet, Haydn, Bizet, Rossini, and others." Barrère's press agent cited this piece, along with Symphony Digest, as evidence of Barrère's light touch in programming for his Little Symphony.

Admission: Reservations Required

Yes, admission is free but Reservations are required. To reserve seats, call the New York Public Library Music Division at 212/870-1649. The limit is two seats per person and space is limited so reserve early. Reservations will be held until 4:20 pm; after that, anyone who comes to the door will be admitted on a space-available basis.

The reception and opening of the exhibit Georges Barrère and the Flute in America will be held in the Music Division on the third floor of the Library. If you wish to come to the reception and exhibit opening only, come to the Amsterdam Avenue entrance of the library (111 Amsterdam Avenue) at 6:30 pm and tell the guard you are attending the reception (no reservation necessary).
